The NB system of documentation presents bibliographic information in endnotes and a bibliography.

This AMPS formatting & style guide includes examples of citations using the NB system as well as common general style issues.

E BOOK

Books consulted online are also cited exactly as their print counterparts with the addition of a DOI (or URL) at the end of the citation

JOURNAL ARTICLE

In a note, list the specific page numbers consulted, if any. In the bibliography, list the page range for the whole article.

Article in a print journal

Example:

BIBLIO: Weinstein, Joshua I. "The Market in Plato's Republic." Classical Philology 104 (2009): 439–58.

Article in an online journal

Online periodicals are cited exactly as their print counterparts with the addition of a DOI or URL at the end of the citation.

ENDNOTE: Kirsi Peltonen et al. "Parental Violence and Adolescent Mental Health," European Child & Adolescent Psychiatry 19, no. 11 (2010): 813-822, doi: 10.1007/s00787-010-0130-8.

BIBLIO: Peltonen, Kirsi, Noora Ellonen, Helmer B. Larsen, and Karin Helweg-Larsen. "Parental Violence and Adolescent Mental Health." European Child & Adolescent Psychiatry 19, no. 11 (2010): 813-822. doi: 10.1007/s00787-010-0130-8.

Article in a newspaper or popular magazine

If you consulted the article online, include a DOI or URL. Access dates should be located immediately prior to the DOI or URL

Paper presented at a meeting or conference

WEBSITE

Because such content is subject to change, include an access date or, if available, a date that the site was last modified.

GENERAL STYLE

Architecture_MPS prefers style issues are handled according to guidelines set out in Chicago Manual of Style, 17th edition. For publication, we may make minor changes in the copyediting process for consistency of production.

Following are some of the most common. For further information or when in doubt, refer to Chicago Manual of Style, 17th edition.

For Subsequent References to the Same Source:

When referring to a work cited in the note immediately preceding, the use of ibid is now discouraged. Use the author last name and the page number.

ENDNOTE (first instance): Gilbert Herdt, *Same Sex, Different Cultures: Exploring Gay and Lesbian Lives* (Boulder, CO: Westview Press, 1997), 32.

Subsequent endnote: Herdt, 32.

When referring to a work cited earlier in your text, use the author last name, a shortened title and the page number.

ENDNOTE (first instance): Gilbert Herdt, *Same Sex, Different Cultures: Exploring Gay and Lesbian Lives* (Boulder, CO: Westview Press, 1997), 32.

Subsequent endnote: Herdt, Same Sex, 32.

Symbols

Ampersand (&): Always spell out "and" in text, endnotes, or bibliography

Word as Word

Use quotation marks, not italics: e.g. They define "causality" differently.

Dates

Use month-day-year format, with months always spelled out: October 10, 2002.

No punctuation when only month and year are given: August 1945

Centuries and Decades

Spell out references to particular centuries: the twentieth century, eighteenth-century history, mid-eighteenth-century poet, a late nineteenth-century poet. Note: no apostrophe before the "s": the 1880s and 1890s (not 1880's and '90s)

Numbers—Digits and Words

Spell out numbers one through one hundred.

Numbers with two words should be hyphenated (thirty-seven).

Round numbers followed by hundred, thousand, hundred thousand, million, and so forth should also be spelled out.

Punctuation— Periods and commas

Periods and commas precede closing quotation marks, whether double or single.
